<p>Results: Comments on the course implementation and the results based on an assessment of the students' actual learning outcomes in relation to the course's intended learning outcomes are summarised here (incl. information regarding the result of the examination). Both success factors and problems are identified</p>
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<p>Although attendance was high, there was varying participation in seminar discussions, which some students felt was a distraction during these sessions. There was also a very large variation in the submission of written assignments, which resulted in an unusually high failure rate.</p>
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<p>Analysis: Analysis based on a summary of the students' individual course evaluations – both formative as summative. Produced in collaboration with the teachers involved in the course; alternatively, the views of participating teachers are taken into account.</p>
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<p>The summary course evaluation shows that the learning outcomes of the course have been reached to a high extent, also with regards to seminars and written assignments. Students overwhelmingly report that their prior learning experience has been beneficial and assisted their learning on the course and that the course was research based. They also reported that they were able to affect the course in terms of the essay and poster topic, as well as the engagement in seminars.</p>

<p>Action plan: Changes to be made in the short and long term are stated here, as well as the timetable for when the actions will be implemented, as well as the person responsible for the implementation.</p>
